FIRST STOP ON THE PARADE ROUTE

The first public school in the United States, 1635

Founded in 1635, this is the site of the very first public school in the United States. It stands as a symbol of the belief that public education, pre-K through college or trade school, should be free and accessible to all.



Here, the American Federation of Teachers Massachusetts, Boston Teachers Union, and Massachusetts Teachers Association are leading the charge—lifting up the fight against devastating federal cuts and attempts to privatize public education while also highlighting what union educators have won together in solidarity.

Public education is the cornerstone of equality, democracy, and opportunity. Today, just like in 1635, educators are standing strong to protect classrooms from billionaires looking to profit, and to defend every child's right to learn, grow, and thrive.

NEXT STOP

60 State Street, home to BlackRock

With more than \$10 trillion in managed assets, BlackRock is a symbol of corporate greed. BlackRock and its investors profit by backing:

- Union-busting employers like Republic Services, the billionaire waste and recycling corporation where Teamsters Local 25 members are on strike for fair wages, benefits, and labor protections.
- Al corporations threatening good jobs, like the parent corporation
 of robot taxi company Waymo, which is trying to bully its way into
 Massachusetts despite the objections of app drivers, people with
 disabilities, first responders, and other community members.
- Private prison companies locking up people detained by ICE.

Anchored by Community Labor United, this stop calls out Wall Street giants who put profit over people. Together, we demand accountability and insist that our public dollars are invested in workers, families, and communities—not in corporations undermining our rights and our democracy.

Where Labor History Runs Deep

In 1834, the very first Building and Construction Trades Union Council gathered here, laying the foundation for solidarity that still drives us today.

More than a century later, in 1954, Colonial Meat Provision Company tried to divide workers by bringing in Black strikebreakers from Roxbury.



But instead of division, United Food and Commercial Workers organized those workers into the union—and won!

Anchored today by Greater Boston Building Trades Unions and UFCW 1445, this stop reminds us that when we stand togetheracross race, trade, and community-solidarity always wins. No matter the decade, no matter the century, Boston is a union town, and organized labor always stands up for our community and the public good!

ONWARD TO OUR FOURTH STOP

100 Sudbury Street

Here, SEIU 32BJ janitors have been locked in a tough fightback for more than a year, after a group of cleaners were suddenly displaced at this luxury apartment tower in Downtown Boston. Since the summer of 2024, workers have stood their ground, demanding fair treatment and pay while corporations stall and exploit.

The demand is clear: restore union jobs now. These janitors deserve fair wages, secure jobs, and justice on the job. This fight isn't about just one workplace—it's about every worker who keeps our buildings and communities running every single day.

JFK Federal Building
